NOTICE OF INTENT TO SEEK THE DEATH PENALTY

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The United States of America, pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3593(a), notifies the Court and defendant MARIO CASTILLO, aka WHISPER, that the Government believes the circumstances of the offenses charged in Counts Five, Six, Seven, Twenty-Three, Twenty-Four and Twenty-Five of the First Superseding Indictment are such that, in the event of a conviction, a sentence of death is justified under Chapter 228 (Sections 3591 through 3598) of Title 18 of the United States Code, and that the Government will seek the sentence of death for the following offenses: the murder of Richard Serrano in aid of racketeering, in Violand of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1959(a) 1) Count Five] and/or

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through the use of a firearm, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 924(c),(j) [Count Twenty-Three]; the murder of Jose Martin Gutierrez in aid of racketeering, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1959(a)(1) [Count Six] and/or through the use of a firearm, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 924(c),(j) [Count Twenty-Four]; and the murder of Enrique Delgadillo in aid of racketeering in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1959(a)(1) [Count Seven] and/or through the use of a firearm, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 924(c),(j) [Count Twenty-Five], each of which carries a possible sentence of death.

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The Government proposes to prove the following factors as justifying a sentence of death.

- A. Statutory Proportionality Factors Enumerated under 18
 U.S.C. § 3591(a)(2)(A)-(D).
 - 1. Intentionally Killing the Victim.

The defendant intentionally killed Richard Serrano [Counts 5 and 23], Jose Martin Gutierrez [Counts 6 and 24] and Enrique Delgadillo [Counts 7 and 25]. Section 3591(a)(2)(A).

2. Intentionally Inflicting Serious Bodily Injury
Resulting in Death.

The defendant intentionally inflicted serious bodily injury that resulted in the death of Richard Serrano [Counts 5 and 23], Jose Martin Gutierrez [Counts 6 and 24] and Enrique Delgadillo [Counts 7 and 25]. Section 3591(a)(2)(B).

3. Intentional Acts to Take Life or Use Lethal Force. The defendant intentionally participated in an act, contemplating that the life of a person would be taken or intending that lethal

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force would be used in connection with a person, other than one of the participants in the offense, and Richard Serrano [Counts 5 and 23], Jose Martin Gutierrez [Counts 6 and 24] and Enrique Delgadillo [Counts 7 and 25], died as a direct result of the act. Section 3591(a)(2)(C).

B. Statutory Aggravating Factors Enumerated under 18
U.S.C. § 3592(c).

The following statutory aggravating factors apply to each of Counts 5, 6, 7, 23, 24 and 25.

- 1. Grave Risk of Death to Additional Persons
- The defendant, in the commission of the offense or in escaping apprehension for the offense, knowingly created a grave risk of death to one or more persons in addition to the victim of the offense. Section 3592(c)(5).
 - 2. Substantial Planning and Premeditation.
- The defendant committed the offense after substantial planning and premeditation to cause the death of a person, Richard Serrano. Section 3592(c)(9).
 - 3. Multiple Killings or Attempted Killings.
- The defendant intentionally killed or attempted to kill more than one person in a single criminal episode. Section 3592(c)(16).
 - C. Other, Non-Statutory, Aggravating Factors Identified under 18 U.S.C. § 3593(a)(2).
 - 1. Future Dangerousness of the Defendant.

The defendant is likely to commit criminal acts of violence in the future that would constitute a continuing and serious threat to the lives and safety of others, as evidenced by, at least, one or more of the following:

a. Other Acts of Violence.

The defendant has committed, attempted to commit, and/or threatened to commit other acts of violence, in addition to the capital offenses committed in this case and the statutory factors alleged in this Notice, including, at least, the crimes alleged against defendant in the First Superseding Indictment and the following crimes and acts:

- i. Conduct related to defendant's May 3, 1994 arrest for possession/purchase cocaine base for sale (Cal. Pen. Code § 11351.5)
- ii. Conduct related to defendant's July 16, 1994 arrest for
 negligent discharge of a firearm (Cal. Pen. Code §
 246.3)); carrying a loaded weapon (Cal. Pen. Code
 \$ 12031(a)); and carrying a concealed weapon (Cal. Pen.
 Code § 12025(a))
- iii. Conduct related to defendant's September 4, 1994 arrest for being a minor in possession of a firearm (Cal. Pen. Code § 12101(a))
 - iv. Conduct related to defendant's September 28, 1994
 conviction for carrying a concealed weapon (Cal. Pen.
 Code § 12025(a)(2)
 - v. Conduct related to defendant's January 30, 1997 arrest for possession of a loaded firearm with prior convictions (Cal. Pen. Code § 12031.5(a)) and carrying a concealed firearm (Cal. Pen. Code § 12025)
 - vi. Conduct related to defendant's January 6, 1998

 conviction for possession/purchase of cocaine base for sale (Cal. Pen. Code 11351.5) and related arrest on

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- September 26, 1997 for 11351.5 and possession of a firearm by convicted felon (Cal. Pen. Code § 12021(a))
- vii. Conduct related to defendant's May 7, 1998 arrest for assault with a deadly weapon, not a firearm, with force likely to create great bodily injury (Cal. Pen. Code § 245(a)(1))
- viii. Conduct related to defendant's April 15, 1999 arrest for possession/purchase of cocaine base for sale (Cal. Pen. Code § 11351.5)
 - ix. Conduct related to defendant's October 30, 1999 arrest for battery on a peace officer (Cal. Pen. Code § 243(B))
 - b. Affiliation with Mexican Mafia and Participation in Gang-Related Acts of Violence.

As a result of the defendant's affiliation with the Mexican Mafia and participation in gang-related acts of violence, he would pose a continuing danger to others, including other inmates, prison guards and those outside of prison, if incarcerated. The government will rely both on evidence presented during the guilt phase and additional evidence to be presented at any penalty phase concerning the Mexican Mafia's activities in state and federal jails and prisons.

c. Lack of Remorse.

The defendant has demonstrated a lack of remorse for the capital offenses committed in this case, by statements to Max Torvisco following the murder.

2. Uncharged Murder

The defendant has been involved in another murder which is not reflected in his criminal record, specifically the murder of Angel Salas on September 15, 1997.

3. Victim Impact

The government will present evidence concerning the effect of the offense on the victims and the victims' families, including victim impact statements identifying the victims of the offense and the extent and scope of the injury and loss suffered by the victims and the victims' families, and any other relevant information.
